## Letter from the Executive Director

"You're not just designing a building. You're designing a piece of the city."

This quote by architect Moshe Safdie is included in our upcoming traveling exhibition Towers of Tomorrow with LEGO® Bricks. When we visited this exhibit prior to bringing it to Omaha, I was struck by the power of those words. I have spent the past 19 years walking the halls of Union Station and while caring for this art deco masterpiece is a point of pride for our team, there is, at times, a feeling of "standing too close to our painting." The cracks, chipped paint and rusted steel require constant focus and resources. This spring, restoration and preservation specialists from Evergreene Architectural Arts have gone to new heights to care for the museum's decorative



ceilings in the Suzanne and Walter Scott Great Hall. Rising nearly 60 feet, the floor-to-ceiling scaffolding took on a "towers of tomorrow" look of its own. This work came on the heels of a comprehensive exterior restoration project led by masonry experts from McGill Restoration. Not only did this team repair cracks and spalling in the terra cotta skin, but they also engineered a plan to remove rows and rows of terra cotta bricks to replace the corroded angle irons behind them. It took creativity, ingenuity, patience and skill. Union Station is much more than a beautifully designed building. It is a signature part of our community. One that represents strength, vision and hard work.

Speaking of hard work, while the museum team was busy caring for Union Station, our friends from LOLUG (Lincoln and Omaha LEGO® User Group) were busy constructing a near-perfect LEGO® replica of their own. The scale and level of detail is awe-inspiring, and we are excited to showcase this piece, along with the work of LEGO®-certified professional Ryan McNaught, during the Towers of Tomorrow exhibition. McNaught and his team devoted nearly six months of constant

construction, along with their own creativity, ingenuity and skill, to build the

structures featured in the exhibition.

We look forward to welcoming you to the museum in the coming months. Whether you enjoy viewing amazing architecture or creating your own, this "piece of the city" will have so much to see and do...or should I say, build?





#### **Last Chance!**

**Descendants of DeWitty** Now - May 28

This 27-photo exhibition shares the history of the people of DeWitty, later known as Audacious, the largest and longest-lasting African American settlement in rural Nebraska. The settlers, including former slaves who had fled to Canada before the Civil War and their descendants, began to arrive in 1906-07, attracted by the 1904 Kinkaid Act's offer of 640 acres of free land in the Sandhills. The traveling exhibit is on loan from the Descendants of DeWitty, NE organization.

#### Honoring 75 Years: The History of Omaha's World War II Memorial Park June 3 - September 3

America entered World War II following the Japanese attack on Pearl Harbor on December 7, 1941. In 1943, before the outcome of the war was even assured, Mrs. Lulu N. Broad, owner of the Gypsy Tea House, wrote a letter to Henry Doorly, publisher of the *Omaha World-Herald*, suggesting construction of a memorial for Douglas County area service men and women.

After nearly a year of study by Omaha civic leaders, the World War Memorial Association, a charitable corporation, was formed and suggested the 65-acre tract of land formerly occupied by the Happy Hollow Country Club and later, the Dundee golf course, to become the site of a permanent tribute for

On June 5, 1948, one day before the fourth anniversary of the invasion of Normandy ("D-Day") the citizens of Omaha welcomed President Harry S. Truman to formally dedicate World War II Memorial Park to the people of Douglas County.







## From the Curator

## **State Fair Beginnings for The Knights of Aksarben**

After an unimpressive experience for the 1894 State Fair in Omaha, the Nebraska State Fair Board informed Omaha's business leaders of the ultimatum to provide better entertainment and provisions for visitors or lose the fair to Lincoln.

These men viewed the State Fair as crucial to Omaha's growth and prosperity, and they formed The Knights of Aksarben (formerly Ak-Sar-Ben) to fundraise and organize a year of unparalleled entertainment. Parts of their plan included securing floats from the previous year's New Orleans Mardi Gras parade and reproducing a similar celebration through a series of parades and street pageants. The first parade, "The glory. Advertising efforts included a proclamation from the anonymous 'King Aksarben I' along rail lines, souvenir badges and pins and a local musician's composition titled "Knights of Ak-Sar-Ben March" distributed throughout Omaha.

From September 15-21, entertainment included a bicycle parade with costumed riders, military and civic parades and the premier of the Aksarben Ball and Coronation, which concluded the fair week. Firework shows also took place before each nightly parade. Unlike the previous year, Omaha also accommodated over 100,000 visitors as hotel rooms kept low rates and homeowners rented out extra rooms.




The State Fair did not stay in Omaha the following year, but The Knights of Aksarben went above and beyond the expectations set for them. The effort to keep Omaha on the map succeeded and the Trans-Mississippi and International Exposition was conceived in 1895 for similar reasons. Omaha's people showed that they could proudly host many visitors, and they would do it again during the 1898 Trans-Mississippi and International Exposition with over two million visitors.


#### The Feast of Mondamin Panel

The name "The Feast of Mondamin" had been selected from a list of proposed names for the parade, and Nebraskan Louise MacDonaugh's suggestion won. The Knights of Aksarben offered the prize of \$10 for the winning name – an equivalent to over \$300 today.






#### Art Deco Awe!

We have made significant progress with the ongoing ceiling restoration project this spring. Changes are noticeable in the West End Corridor where the "steps" flanking the beams and framing the ornamental ceiling panels changed from green to brown. The team from EverGreene Architectural Arts discovered the original color – dark brown – when studying the layers of paint as well as examining historic photos. The work in the Suzanne and Walter Scott Great Hall has added a special shine to the space. The restoration crew spent time applying fresh aluminum leaf to the grates around the chandeliers as well as to the silver and gold capitals at the top of the columns along the walls. In both spaces, the scope of work included repairing damaged plaster, repainting large fields of color and touching up decorative elements where needed. The museum team is grateful to the community, museum members and donors for the support which has enabled us to execute this project and continue our mission in caring for Omaha's Union Station, a National Historic Landmark!
