Letter from the Executive Director

It's Official!

The body of an email dated January 11, 2017, from Mark Chavez, former Historical Architect for the National Park Service - Midwest Regional Office was simple: **Omaha Union Station is a National Historic Landmark!**

This news came three months after Mark and his landmark application co-author, architectural historian Dena Sanford, made their case to the National Park Service's National Historic Landmark Advisory Committee. The Committee voted unanimously to advance Omaha Union Station's nomination to the Advisory Board and the Board's approval on November 18, 2016 sealed the deal. The Secretary of the Interior would add her signature at the start of the new year, making it official.

Eight years later, the National Park Service will once again find its way to the center of our work. Late last year, the museum applied to the Save America's Treasures grant program administered through the National Parks Service in partnership with the National Endowment for the Arts, the National Endowment for the Humanities and the Institute of Museum and Library Services. This was both a rigorous and

highly competitive funding opportunity.

With three short words (and more exclamation points than we could count) our Director of Museum Operations shared the news: **We got it!**

The museum was awarded a \$750,000 gift to support the replacement of Union Station's roof and joins the over \$1,000,000 raised from private sources. This project is the third part of a multi-phase effort to ensure the long-term preservation of our historic structure. Phase one restored the building's exterior facade while phase two addressed repairs and restoration to its Art Deco ceilings.

Had it not been for Mark and Dena's years of research, writing and rewriting nearly a decade earlier, the Save America's Treasures award would not have been possible. We are tremendously grateful to this visionary team, to our many donors and to our community for investing in this national treasure. Your support makes a difference and while my sentiment may be short, it is truly heartfelt:





Exhibit on Display November 9, 2024 - January 12, 2025



In 1914, tensions throughout Europe erupted into the start of The Great War following the assassination of Archduke Franz Ferdinand. The United States joined the Allied Powers in

1917 to oppose the Central Powers in a conflict remembered today as World War I.

Rudolph "Doc" Cook, a photographer who enlisted to join the war effort, served with the 88th Infantry Division, 313th Engineers of Camp Dodge in Iowa and captured the company's experiences with his camera. Many of these images were published in Camp Dodge's newspaper, Camp Dodger, and official books detailing the conflict. Instead of battles, the world through "Doc" Cook's lens included different training regimens for the American Expeditionary Forces, such as gas mask trials, boxing programs and bridge building. Overseas, Cook's images included war-torn

structures, trenches, celebrations following Armistice Day and the reconstruction of a train line by the 313th Engineers.

A century later, local resident Mollie Anderson purchased a case that belonged to Cook. The case contained his original photographic negatives. After researching Cook's life and displaying some of the images at Fremont's Gallery 92 West in 2022, she donated the collection to The Durham Museum.

Beyond Combat: World War I Through the Lens of "Doc" Cook is a temporary exhibition developed by The Durham Museum. The exhibit also plans to feature loans from fellow institutions including the editor of Camp Dodger Lieutenant Laurence Fairall's uniform, copies of Camp Dodger and trench art (decorated artillery shells). The display will include a small theater area featuring additional images in which guests are invited to linger and immerse themselves in the 313th Engineers' experience.

From the Curator


Figuring Out a Photo

Curating exhibits involves studying multiple resources to help tell the story. Photographs play a valuable role as they add a visual aspect for viewers to see history in action. For the upcoming exhibit, Beyond Combat: World War I Through the Lens of "Doc" Cook, the many photos "Doc" took during his time overseas from September 1918 through May 1919 provide a unique perspective into the soldiers' experiences during a global conflict.

One step in developing the interpretation is determining what stories these pictures tell. For this, a curator must do a little detective work. Where was the photo taken? When? Can we identify who is in this photo? These are a few of the many

questions that a curator can answer with a little extra research — and luck in some cases!

Here are a few informative details our curator, Chelsea Olmsted, learned about some of "Doc" Cook's photos during the research process.



Elements of these soldiers' uniforms suggest that they're likely training in the United States at the time these photos were taken. The campaign hats and canvas leggings were worn while stateside and were traded out for a narrow overseas cap or metal helmet and wrap leggings, also known as puttees, when in Europe.

Other clues are much smaller. In this image, one of the soldiers has the 88th Division's cloverleaf insignia on his shoulder. This symbol was not adopted until after Armistice Day, November 11, 1918, suggesting that this image took place post-armistice. Seeing the soldiers packed onto a large ship led our curator to try to find information about their return to the United States in 1919. Through the research process, our curator located the May 1919 passenger list for the USS Pocahontas, which contains "Doc" Cook's name, so it is possible this is an image of the 88th Infantry Division aboard that ship.

Christmas Day Jailbreak Now - March 9, 2025

On December 25, 1938, at 7:10PM, inmates Marvin Brown, Phil Erwin, Paul Romano and Fred J. Roberts escaped from the Douglas County Jail in downtown Omaha. After Roberts jumped Deputy Sheriff Joe Rosenbloom and stole his keys, the prisoners began their attempt at a grand escape. They forced their way out of the courthouse, stole a car and fled. Within the next 48 hours a second stolen car was chased into a ditch and the escaped convicts were found one-by-one on farm land outside the city and returned to custody. Their attempt at an escape had failed. This exhibit features nine images from the museum's Photo Archive.

Pastime Print: Graham's Magazine Now - April 6, 2025

Philadelphia businessman George Rex Graham became the owner of two magazine publications, *The Casket* and *Burton's Gentleman Magazine*, and combined them into *Graham's Lady's and Gentleman's Magazine*. The serial published colorful illustrations, tales and poetry featuring notable authors, travel information and much more from January 1841 to the late 1850s. These magazines offered a glimpse into what entertainment and trends were popular for their readers at the time.

Get a peek at what fashion, recreation and stories were part of the culture for the mid-19th century in this display curated by The Durham Museum intern Michael Ermitaño, University of Nebraska at Omaha graduate.






Mutual of Omaha's Wild Kingdom




